WHAT IS CRIME?

- noun
- ➤ An action or omission that constitutes an offense that may be prosecuted by the state and is punishable by law
 - Illegal activities
 - An action or activity that, although not illegal, evil, shameful, or wrong

WHAT CAUSES CRIME?

The causes of crime are complex but can be connected to:

- Poverty,
- Low self-esteem,
- Unemployment,
- Alcohol and drug abuse

POVERTY

- POVERTY is perhaps one of the most concrete reasons why people commit crimes. Economic deprivation is seen as a major instigator.
- You will be shocked to know that 3 billion people in this world are categorized as poor and living on a very low per capita income.
- More than 20,000 children die due to poverty every day. In a country where economic deprivation is rampant, it is common for people to engage in criminal acts. Hunger and poor economic conditions lead many people to criminal activity.

POVERTY (continued):

 Many young people engage in criminal activities because they believe it is their responsibility to take care of their impoverished household(s) even if it means to commit a felony.

 Society dictates, currently, that money is valued more than relationships and a normal standard of life.

• If you're not able to provide for the entire family as an impoverished individual, at some point, you may consider taking a negative path in order to take care of the family's needs.

LOW SELF-ESTEEM

- LOW SELF-ESTEEM is a new form of concern in the modern world.
 Many young people commit crimes and use drugs because they see a lot of their peers engaging in such acts.
- Youth is a very critical period because one is not always filled with wisdom and experience.

 Youth and young adults become criminals by committing criminal acts due to a lack of strong will and peer pressure.

UNEMPLOYMENT

- UNEMPLOYMENT is a skyrocketing factor in many countries.
- It is often the main reason why so many people commit crimes; more than 30% of people in this world are unemployed.
- Many young people destroy their careers when they engage in criminal activities very early on in one's life and are not able to qualify for jobs due to a blemished criminal background.


ALCOHOL AND DRUGS





EMPLOYMENT INDUSTRIES IN PORTSMOUTH



WHAT IS THE CITY'S CRIME PLAN?

To address the root cause of crime by using a systemic and holistic approach in changing cultural norms and policies in a collaborative and comprehensive manner.

WHAT ARE WE DOING?

- > DEVELOPING CITY'S CRIME PROFILE
- > DEFINING GOALS & OBJECTIVES
- > IDENTIFYING PARTNERSHIPS
- > IMPLEMENTING INITIATIVES
- > GETTING RESULTS

IN PROGRESS:

- Extending youth programs through partnership agreements with Portsmouth Public Schools to secure access to neighborhood school facilities for recreational and after school programs
- (Engaging in Community Participation) working with Civic Leagues throughout the city to obtain short/long term suggestions for crime reduction
- Initiated requests to Dominion Power to enhance lighting within high crime areas as defined by crime data
- Partnering with grass roots organizations to break down the silos that often impede the progress of community engagement and inclusion
- Providing mental health, training classes and initiatives from Social Services and Behavioral Health Services to public safety employees and others to address individual needs

IN PROGRESS (continued):

- Redirecting patrolling in neighborhoods based on key factors (Sheriff Deputies visible and assisting)
- Developing public/private partnership plan of action for violent crime reduction
- Developing additional outreach strategies for the Portsmouth at work and Hampton Roads workforce development program for youth
- Responding to community concerns to create positive perceptions
- Enforcing blighted buildings (residential and commercial) aggressively
- Increasing maintenance of overgrown vegetation to deter crime
- Hiring new Police Chief; Evaluating all positions that impact crime
- Increasing opportunities for minorities and women owned businesses as a means to combat crime

UNDER DEVELOPMENT/CONSIDERATION:

- Homelessness Initiatives (the city has identified a facility and partnering with the local stakeholders to address homelessness)
- Enhancement of a city-wide mentorship program in the peak crime areas
- Development of internal and external operations procedures improving on how we engage with the community
- Educating and open communication in our community and across the organization on city goals and transparency
- Technology integration which will increase efficiencies and expand the city's footprint
- Training and accountability to ensure optimal performance and service
- Setting city-wide curfews for kids
- Identification of safe school zones throughout the city
- Increase protection for residents who work with the city to assist in identifying neighborhood injustices and crime
- Partnering with community stakeholders to identify grant funding for vocational education programs for youth, adults and families

RESEARCH:

- Accountability for residents that have an excess of complaints for illegal activity within the communities (criminal blight)
- Housing initiatives and incentives for employees that live in Portsmouth with public safety being the 1st priority
- Leverage city resources with grants that allow for crime reduction programs
- Public safety divisions collaborating with national organizations in problem-solving approaches
- Reconsider Tech programs in schools for skilled trades
- Approaches to engaging parents and addressing existing stigmas regarding skilled trades

NEXT STEPS:

- Complete comprehensive crime strategy
- Develop grassroot grants process, metrics and measures
- Continue discussions with PPS and develop action plan for CTE (certified and technical education) programs
- Develop crime financial plan and budgeting

CALL TO ACTION:

Crime is not only an issue in Portsmouth, but also an issue that is plaguing our Nation.

The city's call to action will require all of Portsmouth in this fight; it is not a one person show or an overnight fix.

As we continue to knock down barriers, boundaries and stigmas that surround this great city, we must lean on eachother for help and support.
